Truth-Telling



As a child, Elizabeth Hindson was raised by her grandparents on a cattle station and a dairy farm in the south Burnett district. Her family then settled in a cottage about 2 miles from the township of Goomeri before moving to a timber milling and forestry management hamlet near Kilcoy. Hindson was made aware of her colour, and experienced discrimination for the first time on the first day of primary school.

Elizabeth later moved to Brisbane where she qualified as a social worker. Professionally, she worked for most of her career in senior roles for the Department of Aboriginal and Islander Affairs with the Queensland Government.

She was a contributor to *Indigenous Peoples: In the Wake of Mabo*, a publication in 1997 which is a collection of papers contributing to the debate on human rights issues affecting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Australia.

Still an active community member, Elizabeth Hindson is involved in many community services, the arts, and Baha'i Faith.
